2013 ANNUAL REPORT

President's Message

The New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation, Inc. (NCMFPEF) was established January 21, 2010. This year's Annual Report is dedicated to the late Roxson "Rock" Blount, initial director and founder of the Foundation and it treasurer until his death this year. Rock, as we called him, was a stellar member who often extended himself to make sure the Achievement and Scholarship Breakfast Award program a success and that all money was accounted for and accurately entered into the financial books. His services will be remembered for years to come.

In 2013, the Foundation continued its commitment to the youth of Chesapeake. Since the Foundation was legally chartered, forty one (41) African American males have received \$1,000.00 scholarships and thirty eight (38) students have received book stipends. All of the 2013 recipients were certified to receive their awards, and are presently attending colleges and universities throughout the United States. This year, the Foundation presented a \$250.00 scholarship to Anthony Brickhouse so that he could meet his financial obligation for admission to Virginia State University. I wish to note that 2014 will be the graduation year for the 2010 scholarship recipients.

The 2013 NCMPEF Achievement and Scholarship Award program was attended by 450 adults, sponsors, governmental and school officials along with a number of corporate and civic leaders. Mr. Vincent Lockhart, State Farm Insurance Agency Administrative Leader delivered a personal and uplifting speech in which he challenged the twenty one (21) students to aspire to be what they are capable of regardless of personal or family circumstances.

State Farm was a \$5,000.00 sponsor for the third year. In addition, Towne Bank and S. B. Ballard Construction Company became Gold Sponsors contributing \$5,000.00 each. The Foundation also received \$1,000.00 Corporate Tables Sponsorships from Tidewater Community College, Old Dominion University, Regent University, and Virginia Union University joined as a new Corporate Sponsor. The Honorable Phillip and Dr. Jean Infantino continued to support the Foundation by donating \$1,000.00. The Chesapeake Conference Center gave the Foundation in-kind services valued at \$1,000.00 for the breakfast.

Norfolk State University, Chesapeake Sheriff Charities, Chesapeake Regional Health Care and several churches continued their support of the breakfast as table sponsors. First Church of Christ (USA) Holiness, The Way, The Truth, The Light Church, and Trinity Diamond Baptist Church continued their annual support of the breakfast. The Foundation needs to make an assertive effort to get more churches to sponsor tables.

Special thanks are extended to Ms. Brenda Andrews, publisher of The New Journal and Guide and to Ms. Angela Jones, publisher of The Hampton Roads Messenger for the valuable press coverage given to getting our story out to the community.

Twenty-six (26) members participated as full table sponsors. If we are to live up to our mission, it is imperative that all members support the efforts of the Foundation. As stated in our motto "forging ahead and striving for excellence" we must build on our legacy in 2014. The Foundation can only grow and gain respect when we respect it by doing more. We need to expand our support of outreach initiatives—the Boys and Girl Club, Back-To-School Supplies, and especially the Carver Intermediate School Lunch Buddy mentoring program. Our children cannot become what they need to be by remaining what they are. "Even eagles need a push to soar."

We need to re-establish the partnership we forged with Delta Sigma Theta Sorority in 2012. The Foundation should support their Youth Esteem Building Seminar. In the past, the relationship proved to be fruitful and productive for both organizations, especially the youth in attendance. We must strengthen our relationship with The New Chesapeake Men for Progress, our parent organization. We need their support and they need our.

In 2012, the Foundation's directors and scholarship committee will seek to build on its partnership with the Chesapeake Redevelopment and Housing Authority (CRHA). Unfortunately, CRHA did not qualify a student to receive a scholarship in 2013. Like last year, I recommend that the Board establish a protocol whereby the Foundation can provide tutorial and tuition assistance to qualified public housing students. We realize that many of these students have greater need for financial assistance and are deserving of being considered for financial aid.

Awarding of more scholarships is contingent on demonstrating to our current sponsors and potential donors/sponsors that we are good stewards of their funds. However, we cannot depend entirely on external funding. You and I must work harder to generate funding through soliciting of ads and sponsorships from the businesses we support. In addition, we need members with experience in writing grants to major foundations, and governmental agencies. It is imperative that each of us make a personal donation to the Foundation in addition to your yearly dues of \$60.00. Other Foundation's usually look to see what board members are giving as an indication of their serious and commitment to the mission of the Foundation.

In order to continue the Foundation's growth and ability to serve Chesapeake's youth, I hereby submit the following strategic goals for 2014:

- Increase the foundation's financial assets by \$20,000.00.
- Award \$15,000.00 in scholarship and other educational financial assistance.
- Increase the Foundation's membership by 50%.

- Expand support for mentoring initiatives and increase financial support.
- Amend the Foundation's Bylaws to include the position of financial secretary.
- Purchase professional liability insurance to protect officers and directors of the Foundation.

My personal thanks to the Board of Directors, committee chairmen, and members at large for

their support and continued commitment to the mission, goals and values of the Foundation.

Mentoring, School Supplies and Grants

The New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation, Inc. in cooperation with members of The New Chesapeake Men for Progress supports the School Supplies and Material Program for needy students enrolled in Chesapeake Public Schools. The Foundation seeks to assist low-income students and their classrooms by providing funds for school supplies and other related items. These items may iclude pencils and pens,

rulers, backpacks, calculators, notebooks or anything a student needs in the classroom, but unable to afford. A secondary goal of this program is to provide items and resources that will benefit an entire classroom, particularly those in low-median income schools in the district.

Annually, \$100.00 is donated to three schools: G.W. Carver Intermediate School, Truitt Intermediate School, and Thurgood Marshall Elementary School.
